Our Summer 2024 season has been a resounding success, and we couldn't have done it without the support of our staff, community, and donors! The four sessions of our 'Blockbuster' summer hosted campers ages 13-80. Each session was uniquely themed after a film genre, such as Sci-fi and Fantasy, offering a one-of-a-kind experience. These themed sessions were not just popular; they were a hit! Programs like Jedi Training, Dino Dig, and The Magic Academy offered unique and exciting experiences for our campers, keeping them engaged and excited throughout the summer!

This year's overwhelming response underscores the continued need for Camp Thorpe's mission-driven work. Our mission, to provide a joyful and inclusive summer camp experience for teens and adults with developmental disabilities in the beautiful Green Mountains of Vermont, is more important than ever. The impact of our work is clear, and we are committed to continuing to make a difference. We are incredibly proud of the impact we're making together, and we hope you share in this pride.

In 2024, 199 campers stayed with us over our seven-week season. We had 27 counselors, 22 of whom were international. This year, we hosted two miniature donkeys, two goats, and an emu. Our nature program cultivated a grant-funded garden-to-table experience again this year and introduced a new activity that had the campers designing their own potted flower arrangements outside the dining hall for everyone's enjoyment.

As we wrap up this successful year, we want to express our heartfelt gratitude to each and every one of our campers, supporters, and new friends. Your unwavering support and belief in our mission have been instrumental in our success. We look forward to seeing you at Camp Thorpe during our 98th season, and we can't wait to continue this journey with you.

Note From The Health Center

What a wonderful summer of 2024 at Camp Thorpe! First, as always, thank you, thank you, thank you for allowing me to be a part of this amazing camp!

The biggest focus for the Health Center this year was the transition to getting ALL camper meds coming to camp in Dose packaging. We moved into 2024 with a full compliance expectation, but also knowing realistically, we would face some challenges. This was a necessary change for camper safety and staff retention. I am so excited to report that the change was for the most part successful! We had a small number of campers that came without dose packaging or incorrect packaging, and we worked with those families to correct the issues and to educate them as to proper dose packaging going forward. We have a plan in place for next year to eliminate this issue. The result of all of this was intake days ran much smoother and nurses were on their way home by 6:00 pm.

Our second biggest challenge coming into this year was staffing. Again I am pleased to report this year was such an improvement.

Some stats/fun facts to consider when when you think about the health center:

- This summer, we had a staff of three regular nurses: myself, Eva, and Nicole. We had 2 PRN nurses, Gina and Bethany, and two LNAs who worked intake days with us, Brandie and Olivia.
- Over the 7 weeks of camp, the nurses distributed 11,412 prescription medications. This number does not reflect the counselor meds or OTC meds distributed.
- We had 453 visits to the health center that required either an OTC medication or treatment. This, again, does not include counselor visits or visits that did not require medication or treatment. My guess is that number would almost equal the recorded visits.
- We treated things like insect bites, cold symptoms, stomach complaints, minor injuries (cuts scrapes etc.), falls, eye redness, and light-headedness in addition to mental health complaints such as homesickness, anxiety, depression, and panic attacks.
- OTC meds were a frequent ask such as band aids, Tylenol, Tums, Advil, daytime cold medicine, Visine, Milk of Magnesia, and ice packs as well as multiple tubes of hydrocortisone cream and triple antibiotic ointment. The list is mind-boggling!

Yes it was a busy summer at the Health Center, but a WONDERFUL summer!

Shelly asked me how I thought the summer had gone. I didn't hesitate to say I thought things went really well! Yes of course we had some challenges, I can't imagine that won't always be a thing. But regardless of the challenges, we all pulled together and supported each other. Campers had a great summer, Camp was FULL, and smiles and laughter and amazing memories were created! What more could we ask for?

Thank you again for allowing me to continue my journey as part of this amazing family we call Camp Thorpe!

Camper Success Stories


Sometimes, our success stories develop over time. We might see slight changes over their first session at camp, but we see the actual changes a few years in. L is one of these stories. Their first year was in 2022, when they were 16. They were timid and homesick the whole session, crying multiple times a day. However, it was the nurturing environment and the support of our dedicated staff that laid the foundation for their transformation. By the end of the session, we had seen more smiles, but they were still reluctant to participate. They had come with a friend from outside of camp and would mostly interact with just them. Fast forward to 2024: their infectious laughter filled Mountain Reach throughout the day. It took mere hours to get comfortable with their new counselor and cabinmates at the start of the session compared to the days or weeks it took that first summer. It did not take any convincing for them to get up on stage, dressed as Shakira with their cabinmates, laughing the whole time. They no longer needed the safety of the familiar friend from home, having made several new camp friends, which is a testament to the strong bonds that our camp fosters. On several occasions, leadership staff would hear a roar of laughter coming from the other side of the dining hall at mealtime, only to discover that L was the source. L's transformative journey from a timid and homesick camper to a confident and outgoing individual is a profound testament to our camp's life-changing potential. It's a reminder of the profound impact our camp has on our campers' lives.



M is a new camper to us this year. Their parents were very anxious about sending them to camp for the first time. They are new to our country, and their English is limited. The team worked with the family and case manager throughout the off-season to find the best way to support this camper. They came for a tour once camp was in session and were still hesitant. On drop-off day, the family was still very anxious. When I talked to them, they expressed that M had never been away from family before and that the only camps in their home country were family camps. They were worried about the language barrier, his limited communication skills, and being away from them. However, their worries were soon put to rest. Immediately, M adjusted to the schedule and joined in with the activities. Using a translator on their phone and gestures, the counselors could ask M questions about their interests and communicate camp routines. One week in, M woke up every morning, popped out of the cabin, and greeted the counselors and campers, asking them how they were and if they slept. They bonded with several campers and could be heard giggling with them, especially at night when they all were supposed to be sleeping! They participated in everything with a smile and laughter. They chased their friends around the pool, splashing and communicating in their own way. This heartwarming story of M's successful adjustment despite language barriers is a testament to the importance of support and community in our camp's environment.


Programming




Facilities

Camp Thorpe has been making strides in updating and improving our facilities in order to better serve our campers, counselors, and community.


COMPLETED PROJECTS


UPCOMING PROJECTS

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Community

RENTALS

Rentals at Camp Thorpe are a significant part of our income, and we make the most of our short window (mid-August to the start of October). This fall, over 600 guests attended events at Camp Thorpe. Whether it was another camp renting the campus, a retreat with the New England Epilepsy Foundation, the BMW motorcycle rally, or multiple weddings, Camp Thorpe was bustling. We introduced a one-day rental option this year, not just to encourage local couples to spend time with us, but also to involve our community in our operations, and the response was immediate and encouraging, with instant results.

This year, we saw a remarkable 39% increase in rental income compared to last year. This growth, coupled with the addition of the new spring 2025 one-day pavilion rentals, reaffirms our belief in rentals as a vital development area to support our annual budget. This significant increase in rental income is a testament to the camp's work toward financial stability and the confidence our stakeholders can have in our future.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTING CAMP



In 2024, Camp Thorpe was grateful to be the recipient of Lawson's Finest Liquid's Sunshine Fund, which raised \$11,128.89 for Camp. We were also the recipient of Bar Harbor's Casual for a Cause program, which raised \$2,074 for Camp, and Hannaford's Community Bag Program which raised \$208 for Camp.

VOLUNTEERS SUPPORTING CAMP




Financials

Planning for the Future

Our Strategic Planning Session, held on September 28th at the Brandon Inn in Brandon, Vermont, was a collaborative effort involving Camp Thorpe's Executive Director, the Operations and Development Manager, and all 11 members of the Board of Directors. The session was expertly facilitated by Maeve McBride from CPG Enterprises, whose professional guidance was instrumental in our discussions. This in-person time was invaluable for the Board and staff. The ED shared an organizational update with highlights from the staff and camper surveys, and time was spent brainstorming the organization's mission and vision statements. In small break-out groups, board members worked with critical questions regarding programming, finances, and facilities. Finally, the group considered a draft sketch of a proposed capital campaign with specific components and fundraising goals.

This is the second step in our long-range planning. We are now preparing for the next stage, an external feasibility study, which is of utmost importance in our journey towards our major fundraising work and our capital campaign, to launch in 2025. This work is not just vital, but it is also a testament to the significance of our continued success and the ability to continue using our campus to its total capacity to fulfill our mission. In the coming months, we will contact critical stakeholders, donors, and community members to discuss our long-range goals and fundraising needs. Your involvement in this study will be crucial to our future success.
